Now into the second month of being your President, I have been involved with numerous new committees, events and training. Getting ready for Freshers, looking at our actions for the environment, sustainability and accommodation.

This month I have worked with the University on their Academic Offences panels and Fitness to Practise but also, a new oversight group myself and our Vice President Welfare and Community have a seat on. This new group is the 'Climate emergency oversight group'. This group is to set strategies and themes looking into how we as a University and Students' Union can support our environment since both declaring a climate emergency. The group is made up of Students' Union representatives, academics, PVC's and Estates with new focus groups being made up of students on them. This will see academics and students alike working together to make a change to our campus, contributing to saving our planet.
